Mango & Passion Fruit Eton Mess



This is a really easy and very tasty dessert.

For 4:

1 mango diced

2 passion fruit

4 small meringue nests
Small carton double cream

Method:

Peel the mango, remove all flesh & dice it small.

Cut the passion fruit in half & scoop out the pulp.

Break the meringues into bite-sized pieces.

Whisk the cream until it has soft peaks.

Leave until ready to serve. (The meringue will disintegrate if mixed too early.)

Mix the cream & meringue pieces gently.

Divide half of the mango between the 4 glasses. Top with about half of the cream & meringue mix. Repeat, leaving a little mango for the top, then spoon over the passion fruit & top with a few pieces of mango. Delicious!

Last autumn, the Reception class from Newbottle Primary came up to church as part of their school work on Harvest. There were things they weren't expecting, such as the present they thought was a ball, but turned out to be a cuddly toy and the panda's head! Much fun was had by all. But the simple message is Jesus is the best gift of all.

SUSAN HOLMES 1955 – 2024

We were all very saddened to learn about the sudden and untimely death of Susan Holmes, a valued member of our own church family. Sue was warm, caring, joyous and very kind.

She was born to Wilf and Doris on 10th December 1955 and

the house. She enjoyed dancing, had a beautiful singing voice and liked music, especially Motown and Soul, and liked going to Sunderland Empire. She also had a season ticket for Sunderland Football Club

Faith was extremely important to Sue, and she was a regular attender and well-loved member of our church. She was also very supportive of Stephen in his ministry.

We remember the bravery with which she received the news of her diagnosis, and in the end experienced the peace that passes understanding.

Pancake Tuesday comes before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Pancake Day, Lent and Holy Week are all part of the journey to Easter Day, the biggest Christian celebration of the year. It is a time when

lots of people make time to think carefully about their life. For Christians, this means trying to live God's way and remembering all that Jesus did. Pancake Day is also called Shrove Tuesday and is one last chance for a big party before Lent begins with Ash Wednesday the next day. Long ago, Christians traditionally used up all the eggs and fat they had in store by making pancakes and feasting on them. This was because when Lent came, they would eat less food, or even fast to help them focus on God and not on the things they wanted. This tradition has been passed down the generations.

Lots of people "give up" something they really enjoy for Lent – sweets, chocolate, cakes, biscuits or even wine. It's a time for contemplation and resisting temptation.

We hope all our readers enjoyed some pancakes this year. After all life is much batter with them!
